III. Major Group: At least 24 credits in PHIL courses numbered 2000 or above.

- Students must have a cumulative grade point average of 2.0 or better in the major group.
- Only credits earned in residence at the University of Connecticut may be used to meet this requirement, except as approved by the dean of CLAS.
- Courses on Pass/Fail may not be used to meet General Education, Major, or Related requirements, except as approved by the University Senate and CLAS.

IV. The Related Group: At least 12 credits in courses closely related to Philosophy but outside the Philosophy Department. Chosen in consultation with and approved by the Faculty Advisor, and *numbered 2000 or above.*

For students pursuing Honors in Philosophy: To graduate with Honors in the major, a student must (1) be admitted to the Honors Program, (2) satisfy all requirements for graduation as an Honors Scholar, (3) complete all requirements for the Philosophy major, and (4) complete an Honors thesis in Philosophy while taking PHIL 4297W. The Honors thesis is a two-semester sequence. In the first, one undertakes the necessary scholarly research, typically in the course of an independent study or graduate course with the supervising faculty member; in the second, one writes and revises the thesis in the course of PHIL 4297W. *Permission to register for PHIL 4297W is contingent on having completed satisfactory scholarly research in preparation for the thesis.*
